Here's how the Symposium works

In each class, experienced instructors show you how to tie the flies listed in the agenda. They also talk about the flies and how they're fished. You then have time to tie the patterns while the instructors offer hands-on, personal advice.

The Beginner's class is an all-day course. Students learn to tie five different flies. For the Beginner's class, the Symposium will lend you the tools you need.

The rest of the program is for experienced tyers. For any of the other classes, you'll need to bring your own tying tools, thread, and head cement. We supply the hooks and materials.

On an all-day pass, you can attend up to four classes. To help you choose, we've rated the classes according to skill level. "E" stands for "Everyone." This means that a basic level of knowledge is all you'll need to learn the patterns. "I" stands for "Intermediate." The flies demonstrated in these sessions are for those with more developed tying skills.

Once you've selected the classes you want, fill out the Registration Form. To avoid disappointment, mark your first and second choice for each time period. **Class size is limited to twenty on a first come, first served basis. Make sure to register early.**

Your Instructors

Chris Day

Chris hails originally from Clarenville, Newfoundland but has been living in Ontario for the past 12 years. He grew up fishing for Atlantic salmon and brook trout on Newfoundland's east coast. Chris began tying flies more than 20 years ago and, for a while, was a commercial tyer of hairwing salmon flies. For the past few years, Chris has led fly-tying classes for customers at Withafly Tackle shop in Mississauga and has been a featured tyer at Izaak Walton Fly Fishing Club's Canadian Fly Fishing Forum.

Steve Hunt

Steve is one of those fly fishermen who catch more than their fair share of fish. He does it by thinking "outside the box." Whether it's steelhead in Lake Ontario, brown trout on the upper Grand, or carp in Hamilton Harbour, he's always experimenting with new ideas. The patterns he develops are very creative, yet uncomplicated. It's this creativity that has helped Steve win the Coat Tar Classic fly fishing tournament two years in a row. Steve has promised to share some of his winning secrets in his sessions.

Ian Colin James

Ian is one of North America's top fly-fishing guides and fly-tying instructors, combining down-to-earth methods with razor-sharp, Scottish wit. For 29 years, Ian's "no bull" approach to fly-fishing has helped folks learn how to cast, find fish and catch the fish they find. Ian was the first guide on the Grand River. He is now the first in Canada to teach an accredited fly-fishing course: at Fanshawe College in London, where, in 2010, he was the recipient of the President's Distinguished Part-Time Teacher Award. Ian's flies are sold worldwide and several of his original patterns are in the Orvis catalogue. His work is also showcased in the prestigious book series "Flytyers of the World," Volume 3.

John Johnson

At the age of fifteen, John started fly fishing for bass and tying bass poppers that he sold to a local sport shop. After graduating with a bachelor's degree in chemical engineering and a master's degree in industrial engineering from Purdue, he moved to Michigan where he started smallmouth fishing in local rivers and traveling north to fly fish for trout and steelhead. During the next fifty years he honed his abilities throughout Western US and Canada. John has actively taught fly fishing, aquatic biology and fly tying at grade schools, high schools, cub scouts, Boy Scouts, 4H Clubs, TU, and university levels. He is a licensed guide, a certified casting instructor, fly fishing lecturer and a published author of fly fishing articles.

Steve May

Steve is a professional guide and instructor with Grand River Troutfitters. He ties flies commercially and enjoys testing his innovative creations on trout, bass, steelhead, carp, musky, pike and salt water species. Look for his articles in numerous fly fishing publications. He has been the coordinator of the Grand Opportunities Fly Fishing Forum and active volunteer with Friends of the Grand River since 1995. Steve's day-job involves improving the fisheries of Ontario's Grand River through his position as Waterloo Stewardship Coordinator with the Ministry of Natural Resources.

William Gerrard

William has been tying flies for 25 years and has chaired the Fly Tying Symposium for the last eight years. His approach to tying is straightforward: "It's technique and practice, not talent, that make a fly tyer. Anyone can learn how to tie flies." Based on his experience leading fly tying courses for all ages – most recently at Al Flaherty's Outdoor Store in Toronto – William has devised a program for beginners that will take the "mystery" out of fly tying. A team of well-qualified Assistant Instructors supports William in the Beginners Class. Together, they'll make sure you get the coaching you need.
